



HIDOE Actions

Aug. 14 and 15 visits to impacted areas. Superintendent and other Department leaders met with parents, teachers, administrators and community members.

Community liaisons are meeting with families in shelters and community gathering sites to provide support for students.

Executive Team meets daily with Complex Area Superintendent and meetings with principals regarding crisis situations for impacted district and identifying needs.

Executive Team and Complex Area Superintendents meet daily with Federal, State and County Agencies and the Governor.

Superintendent met with U.S. Secretary of Education. Department team meets weekly with U.S. Department of Education Disaster Response team.

Ongoing communication with State and Federal elected officials.

Addressing Needs

Immediate Needs

- Caring for our people/health and welfare of affected school communities
 - School Community Liaisons meeting with affected families to provide information, resources and support
 - Providing mental health support information for students and employees

Communicating with stakeholders


- Principals are sending text messages and accounting for staff
- Department sending information via emails to employees and via media through news releases and social media for public
- Schools' phones going to voicemail and messages being responded to

Supporting affected students

- Established an expedited enrollment process at another school
- Offering distance learning English medium and Kaiapuni Hawaiian language immersion - for eligible students who elect for distance learning

Assessing and repairing facilities

- Completed facilities assessment
- Cleared debris, hired professional cleaners, making repairs on campuses

Addressing Needs Short Term Needs

- Caring for our people/health and welfare of affected school communities
 - Providing mental health support information for students and staff
 - Installing monitors for air quality
- Communicating with stakeholders
 - Established Maui Support Hotline
 - Checking in on students enrolled in Lāhaināluna Complex schools
- Supporting affected students
 - Providing in-person, telehealth and virtual options for counseling
 - Providing Psychological First Aid for Maui schools' staff (also for students who have relocated)
- Starting to prepare staff to reopen schools
 - Psychological First Aid for all staff
 - Staff convenings

- Preparing facilities: Princess
 Nāhi'ena'ena Elementary, Lāhainā
 Intermediate & Lāhaināluna High
 - Environmental testing
 - Health and safety clearance by county, state and/or federal officials
 - Working on internet connectivity

• Temporary Relocation

- Evaluating options for temporary relocation of King Kamehameha III Elementary
- Alternate locations if environmental testing delays reopening longer

- Health and safety during Lāhainā debris removal
- Long term mental health support for staff and students
- Accelerating learning for affected students
- Future site for King Kamehameha III
 Elementary School

- Continued communication and planning with school communities


Additional Supports:


- As of August 16, Central
